**HERITAGE TRACE COMMEMORATIVE BOOKLET PROJECTS  
LOUISIANA PURCHASE BICENTENNIAL**

1. **Historical Walkway** – Walk through a path of Louisiana History and enjoy native plants and a bit of solitude as you contemplate the struggles of the people who settled what is now St. Charles Parish. Location: *To be announced.*
2. **Louisiana Bicentennial Scavenger Hunt** – Roam the Parish of Plenty with friend and family and Enjoy historical finds as history comes alive with a narrative written by local historian, Jeff Roux  
Location: *To Begin at Ormond Plantation*  
Opening: March 16, 2003, 1:00 p.m.
3. **Tribute To Governor Hahn** – Exhibit serves as a tribute to the first Republican governor after The Civil War. Hahn was a civil rights activist at a time when this position was very unpopular and was a man before his time. Presentation by nationally recognized folk artist and Hahnville native, Lorraine Gendron. Exhibit includes a Mississippi River mud bust of Hahn, likeness of cook Antoinette Howard, replica of chair used by Hahn, reproductions of artifacts and possessions. Location: St. Charles Parish Courthouse  
Opening: *To be announced*
4. **In Pursuit of Excellence** – Timeline of the evolution of Black and White Education in St. Charles Parish including information and schools pictures dating back to the early 1800's  
Location: St. Charles Parish School Office  
Opening: August 1, 2003
5. **Music Legends of St. Charles Parish** – Read biographical sketches of the men of music of St. Charles. Hear the sounds that were to bring some international recognition. Locally trained musicians were the first to develop and compose the sounds of jazz, rock and roll and spiritual music to commercial venues in St. Charles Parish.  
Location: West Bank Regional Library  
Opening: February 1, 2003
6. **Heirloom Garment Collection** – Collection of hand sewn antique and recently created garments using authentic European techniques brought over in the early 1700's. One of the few cottage industries that has survived the passage of time.  
Location: Ormond Plantation  
Opening: March 1, 2003
7. **Native American Artifacts Exhibit** – Display of the Native American artifacts found in archeological digs in St. Charles Parish lending insight to the daily living tasks of the Muskogean Tribes that lived in this area in the 1700's.  
Location: West Bank Regional Library  
Opening: January 1, 2003

8. 1811 Slave Revolt – Nationally recognized folk artist Lorraine Gendron depicts the slaves of the 1811 revolt in a collection of painted wood renderings. Audio introduction and presentation by local men of the community simulate the happenings of that fateful day in 1811 when the men who were heroes to the cause for freedom became victims to the attitudes of the time.  
Location: Ormond Plantation  
Opening: January 1, 2002
9. Atlatl Contest and Demonstration – Free demonstration of this early defense and hunting tool used by Native Americans in St. Charles Parish.  
Location: West Bank Bridge Park  
Date: October 4, 2003 – 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.
10. Rural Life Exhibit – Collection of Hunting, Fishing, Farming and Trapping Artifacts which tell the story of life in the early settlements.  
Location: Esperanza Restaurant
